# Sarahanne Buster – Wiesbaden, Germany (3 month STM from January to April 2011) (Written during STM) photo 1

Greetings from True Vine Apostolic Tabernacle! Located in a beautiful country and within a quaint town, I feel so privileged to a part of what God is doing in Wiesbaden, Germany. True Vine Apostolic Tabernacle has only been in commission for one year. We are a mix of military and German nationals combined. We recently had our first German translated service due to revival among the native people! It was a very exciting time for our church! God is softening hearts and pouring out His spirit among the people in Wiesbaden and the surrounding areas. It is catching! The people at True Vine are beginning to let our lights shine upon those around us with boldness.

Passive outreach is our greatest tool here in Germany. Many friendly and loving people in Germany make our mission somewhat easier! We feel so excited about reaching into the community and leading others to a wonderful life of living for the Lord. We are also excited to share a recent testimony of God blessing True Vine Apostolic Tabernacle: our church building is rented from a very sweet couple who has visited the church on occasion. They live far from Wiesbaden and so, are unable to come more often. We received a note from them regarding our utility bill for the year. They wanted to let us know that they took care of 600 euro (775 USD) of the bill, leaving the church with a bill of 30 euro (45 USD)! Thank you Jesus! People that live in this colony have to travel the treacherous and exhausting hill every day, whether it is to go to work, school, or church. Despite the climb and the very little these people have, they never complain and always wear a smile. On July 4, the Hope Corps students & instructors, ministers, saints, missionary Jones & Malone families, and myself were all able to be a part of the La Colonia ground breaking ceremony. This was such a neat experience, and I am so thankful that I had the opportunity to be a part. While the church is under construction, the people that live in the La Colonia area will be traveling to the city of Coxen Hole where Bro. Ponce's church and home are located.

While the Hope Corps students were in Roatan for Intensive Training Week (ITW) some pretty amazing things took place. One particularly incredible event involved "Brother Gilberto." Gilberto is a very tenacious middle-aged man living on the island of Roatan. He is not just your "average Joe," in fact it was known all over the island that if someone needs to "get rid of someone" they could go to Gilberto. Needless to say, the locals told missionary Bro. Jones that Gilberto would never be filled with the Holy Ghost or be baptized in Jesus Name. But God had a different plan! On Sunday during ITW, Gilberto came for service at La Roca de Roatan. That very night he was filled with the Holy Ghost, and just a few days later was baptized in the name of Jesus. When Gilberto came out of the water after being baptized, he was crying and spoke to a few of the Hope Corps students. He told them "I don't want to kill people anymore.
